Another Marylander, Captain George Creighton Carmine, U. S. Navy, just returned from active and thrilling service in the war, was recently welcomed to his native State, notes the Baltimore American. Captain Carmine spent some time at Poplar Grove, about five miles from Preston, where he was born and spent his childhood days. Mr. and Mrs. B. Washington Wright now own this fine old estate. Mrs. Wright is a sister of the naval officer. Captain Carmine was formerly commander of the cutter Apache of the United States Coast Guard Service, and widely known in Maryland waters. He has returned under orders for special naval duty with headquarters at a port in this country. The United States Coast Guard Service automatically became a unit of the United States Navy the moment this country declared war, and Captain Carmine has been in the Navy service for that period. He was appointed to the position of section commander in the Third Naval District, New York, and in September a year ago sailed under orders for the war zone in command of a United States war vessel. For the last 15 months he has seen continuous service in the acute danger zones of the Mediterranean Sea, the English and Bristol Channels and the Irish Sea, and has, no doubt, had thrilling encounters with submarines, but on this point Captain Carmine is silent, his service demanding that he reveal no details of his experiences. Captain Carmine is a graduate of the United States Coast Guard School, receiving his early training on the old practice ship Chase. He has had 30 years of experience in the Coast Guard Service, much of the time in Maryland waters, also at the Great Lakes stations and other points.

Mr. D. Hall Barnhart, of the United States Naval Battery No. 1, an organization with guns which carried dismay to entrenched Germans near Verdun and along the Meuse river, on what is known as the "Sacred Way," writes that these big weapons had a range of about thirty miles and used a projectile weighing 1440 pounds. The battery had its own cars and equipment, down to the least thing. Mr. Barnhart said he saw quite a number of fellows from Maryland and some from the Eastern Shore, but none he knew. "There have been only three casualties in the battery so far. One of these was T. Edwin Price, of Centerville, who died near here of typhoid fever.
